



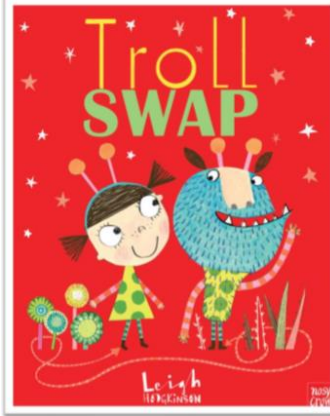
Year 2 Knowledge Organiser: Troll Swap by Leigh Hodgkinson

proper noun	the official name of a person or place - <i>Abby, Liverpool</i> - these always have a capital letter
adjective	used to describe a noun: <i>beautiful</i> necklace
noun phrase	when you see an adjective and noun together, this is a noun phrase - The <i>young princess</i> wore a <i>beautiful necklace</i> .
